Store securely

If you or someone you know owns a firearm, making safety your top priority is essential.

Did you know that firearms are a leading cause of death for children in the U.S. according to the Centers for Disease Control?

The most effective way to reduce firearm-related injuries and deaths, including suicide, is to keep firearms secure, unloaded and stored separately from ammunition.

What the law requires

Minnesota law requires that loaded firearms be secured so children can't get to them. But true responsibility goes further.

Hiding or putting a firearm out of reach isn't enough to keep kids safe.

Use safe, consistent storage practices at home, in your vehicle and anywhere you have a firearm. It can protect your family and prevent tragedy.

Talk to kids and other parents about firearm safety

Simple conversations about firearm safety could make a lifetime of difference.



Teach children early that real firearms are different than toy guns and can cause serious harm.



Talk to your children about what to do if they find a firearm. Keep it simple and clear: Stop! Don't touch. Leave the area. Find an adult immediately.



A Johns Hopkins study shows that one-third of American children live in a home with a firearm. Do your children spend time in someone else's home? Ask the parents or homeowners if there are firearms in the home and how they're stored.

Prioritize mental health

Mental health is an important part of overall well-being for your child. Help is available to identify the warning signs for suicide and other mental health concerns. If you think your child may hurt themselves or others, take extra precautions to secure firearms. Every barrier to access reduces the risk.
